Write Local. Play Global at Artscape Theatre Centre

WRITE LOCAL. PLAY GLOBAL is the ASSITEJ international playwrights network, connecting writers of theatre for young audiences from around the world. The network will be hosting a number of events across the course of the Cradle of Creativity - all taking place at Artscape.

These include:

Thursday 18 May 10h00 -11h00: Cape Town: A Sense of Place - Orientation activity for playwrights

A playwriting activity to encourage artists from around the globe to respond to their impressions of Cape Town through a monologue especially written for young audiences, each set in a very particular place in the city. The activity will culminate in a public sharing and discussion.

Friday 19 May 10h00 - 13h00: Playwriting workshop: A practical exploration- How do you use devising techniques to assist and enhance the new-writing process in Theatre for Young Audiences? - Led by Katy Weir (UK)

Saturday 20 May 18h00 - 19h00: **Theatre for Social Change Playwriting Slam**

Celebrating the world's diverse playwrights for young audiences, these are live readings by the writers in a relaxed setting. Each consists of ten to twelve plays, with five-minute readings from each script, read in the writer's first language.

Wednesday 24 May 18h00 - 19h00: Cape Town: A Sense of Place - Playwriting activity sharing

Sharing of the playwriting activity to encourage artists from around the globe to respond to their impressions of Cape Town through a monologue especially written for young audiences, each set in a very particular place in the city.

Thursday 25 May 18h00 - 19h00: **Playwriting Slam - African Playwrights** Celebrating the world's diverse playwrights for young audiences, these are live readings by the writers in a relaxed setting. Each consists of ten to twelve plays, with five-minute readings from each script, read in the writer's first language.

Friday 26 May 13h45 - 17h00: **Playwriting workshop: New Play Development: Using Your Sensory Toolbox to Unlock the Intuitive Response.** Sensory Dramaturgy with Karin Serres & Deirdre Lavrakas

Friday 26 May 18h00 - 19h00: **Playwriting Slam - Inclusive Playwrights** Celebrating the world's diverse playwrights for young audiences, these are live readings by the writers in a relaxed setting. Each consists of ten to twelve plays, with five-minute readings from each script, read in the writer's first language.

Saturday 27 May 14h00 - 15h45: **Inside New Visions New Voices - Transforming New Play development for Young Audiences** - Write Local, Play Global and South African playwrights: Tamara Guhrs, Jon Keevy, Lereko Mfono, Mojalefa Mlambo and Koleka Putuma. A panel discussion around a successful initiative to develop new writing for young audiences through international exchange at the John F. Kennedy Centre. With readings from some of the South African plays developed through this process.

Saturday 27 May 18h00 - 19h00: **ASSITEJ Inspirational Playwrights** - Words of Innovation, Ingenuity and Imagination from ASSITEJ International Playwrights

When Theatre for Young Audiences Goes Wrong...

"There was a performance by two performers wearing very large old men masks. The children in the audience were slightly too young for the show and it caused one of them to cry. The child walked over to the class teacher to cry on her lap; seeing this, several other children began to follow suit and we had a chorus of crying children who were then all escorted out the theatre".

"My worst theatre for young audiences experience was when I realised the play I had been cast in had a director who had been arrested as a convicted paedophile. The play never got made, he was in jail."
